Exciting News - Funding Grants

Schools Upgrade Grant:

Week 10

Last term we were successful in receiving a Schools Upgrade Fund Grant of \$25,000 to improve and upgrade schools facilities. We applied for the funding to: build a doorway to separate two learning spaces – library and computer room; upgrade two air conditioners (in the main building); painting of sensory movement spaces outside 2 classroom spaces; and painting of the Junior Primary toilets. This work will get underway in the school holidays and continue in term 3.

Smart Giving Grant:

In late 2022 we applied for a Smart Giving Grant – a joint initiative between Pooraka Primary, Valley View High School, North Ingle Primary and Para Vista Primary. The grant was for \$58,000 to fund a project between local primary and secondary schools to support a smooth transition to high school whilst focusing on STEM learning. We were successful with this grant application and work has been underway.

The vision of the project is to improve student outcomes by building the capacity of students and teachers. We want students to embrace transition opportunities by working collaboratively with their peers across levels of schooling, exploring new technologies, and developing new learnings.

We also want Primary and Secondary teachers to work together to enable continuity of learning in STEM by creating common assessment opportunities, team teaching and participating in professional learning.

Last week saw our year 5 and 6 students do their first visit to Valley View for a day of learning and connection. Our students said they had a great time and loved engaging in the different learning opportunities presented. The students will share their learning in the next newsletter.



Don't Worry, Be Happy!

External School Review (ESR)

As part of our continuous school improvement process, Pooraka Primary School will be involved in an external school review with a Department for Education review team. Pooraka's last review was conducted in 2020. All public schools are generally externally reviewed every 3 years.

The purpose of external school reviews is to support us to raise achievement, sustain high performance and provide quality assurance to build confidence in public schools. The review team will identify aspects of our school's improvement that have been verified through the review processes, as well as the improvements that we need to make in the future.

Our ESR dates have been announced for Monday 31st July and Tuesday 1st August 2023.

During the external school review, some students, parents, governing council members and staff will be asked to provide information to the review team in a number of ways. These include:

- group discussions (with students or staff or parents)
- meetings (governing council, staff meeting)
- visits into classrooms.
